To survey a prenatal population, Hillard (1985) screened 742 pregnant women, asking one abuse-focused question. She reported that 3.9% were abused during the current pregnancy. A random sample of 290 pregnant women attending public and private clinics answered nine abusefocused questions; 8% of the women reported abuse during the current pregnancy (Helton, McFarlane, & Anderson, 1987). Berenson, Stiglich, Wilkinson, & Anderson (1991) interviewed 501 women and found 5.5% to have been abused during the current pregnancy. In a postpartum sample of 488 women, 8.3% of the women reported physical abuse during pregnancy, with 29% reporting an increase in the abuse during the pregnancy period (Campbell, Poland, Waller, & Ager, 1992). In one prospective study, Amaro, Fried, Cabral, & Zuckerman (1990) asked one abusefocused question of 1,243 black and Hispanic women, with 7% reporting physical or sexual abuse during pregnancy. Limitations of all these studies include lack of data on the severity or frequency of the injury, relationship of the woman to the perpetrator, and co-existing risk factors of homicide. Additionally, most sampled populations were predominately of one ethnic or racial group, and prevalence rates were calculated on cross-sectional data.

To test the effectiveness of straightforward clinical assessment for abuse, the authors devised a five-question Abuse Assessment Screen (AAS) and interviewed 691 pregnant women, detecting an abuse rate during pregnancy of 16%—a prevalence more than double that of all previous reports (McFarlane, Parker, Soeken, & Bullock, 1992). Further analysis by age revealed a rate of abuse for pregnant teenagers of 21.7% (Parker, McFarlane, Soeken, Torres, & Campbell, 1993).

METHODS

The sample consisted of an ethnically stratified cohort of 1,203 African-American (n = 414), Hispanic (n = 412), and white (n = 377) pregnant women from public prenatal clinics in Houston, Texas, and Baltimore, Maryland. All women in the prenatal clinic were invited to participate in the study, regardless of abuse status. "Hispanic" was defined as non-Anglo, non-African-American, and of Spanish-speaking descent.

INSTRUMENTS

Abuse Assessment Screen (AAS)

The Nursing Research Consortium on Violence and Abuse designed the AAS (Parker & McFarlane, 1991). The AAS consists of five questions to determine the frequency, severity, perpetrator, and body sites of injury within a stated period of time (see Figure 1). Content validity was established for the five-question AAS with a panel of 12 nurse researchers of white, African-American, and Hispanic ethnicities working in the area of abuse of women.
