RESPONSE OPTIONS: True/False and circle the best option (never to very frequently)

SCORING: A "true" response to questions 1, 2, or 4 OR a response of 3 or higher for question 3 is considered a positive screen for ongoing IPV

SURVEY ITEMS:

- 1) Within the last month my partner has threatened me with a weapon. (True / False)
- 2) Within the last month my partner has beaten me so badly that I had to seek medical care. (True / False)
- 3) (Circle the best response) Within the last month my partner has had no respect for my feelings.

4) Within the last month my partner has acted like he or she would like to kill me. (True / False)
